


ZOO DAY AT BPL DURING SPRING BREAK

National Library Week 60th Anniversary

The National Library Week 2018 celebration will mark the 60th anniversary of the first event, sponsored in 1958.

In the mid-1950s, research showed that Americans were spending less on books and more on radios, televisions and musical instruments.

Concerned that Americans were reading less, the ALA and developed a plan for National the American Book Publishers formed a nonprofit citizens organization called the National Book Committee in 1954. The committee's goals were ambitious. They ranged from "encouraging people to read in their increasing leisure time" to "improving incomes and health" and "developing strong and happy family life."

In 1957, the committee Library Week based on the idea that once people were motivated to read, they would support and use libraries. With the cooperation of ALA and with help from the Advertising Council, the first National Library Week was observed in 1958 with the theme "Wake Up and Read!" The 2018 theme is "Libraries Lead".

Ancestry adds new content frequently, so if it has been a while since you've searched this online resource, you may find some new information when you search again.

Due to licensing restrictions, this resource is accessible only at BPL, through any of the public computers. You can also use Ancestry Library Edition on a personal device that's connected to the Library's Wi-Fi network. 

and you can begin studying immediately!




