Barbara Shoff to Discuss DNA Testing for Adoptees

The Bartlesville Public Library will be hosting a talk called **Adoption: The Quest for Biological Family**, presented by genetic genealogist Barbara Shoff.

She will discuss how to use autosomal DNA testing to find biological family members. Her talk will include methods and online tools that can aid in the search, and be used by either adoptees or people who have an adopted relative in their genetic line. She will discuss using a form of "reverse genealogy" to aid in the identification process to find unknown parents. Barbara will also emphasize usage of various online tools to help solve these mysteries.

To better accommodate people's schedules, the class will be repeated twice on Thursday, November 16th.

The first class will be from 2:30PM to 4:30PM.

The second class will be from 6:00PM to 8:00PM.

Both will take place in the Library's meeting room C.

Prison of the Mind

In Rawlins, Wyoming, the infamous Wyoming Frontier Prison stands as a grim testament to the harsh days of Wyoming's early years. In that time, criminals were housed in formidable prisons without heat and harsh punishments for misconduct. The winter of 1933 holds the record for the lowest temperature in Wyoming, -66°. It was even colder inside the prison.

Even more formidable and oppressive than that miserable Frontier Prison is the prison of illiteracy. It is a world of millions who cannot read a simple story to their children. 14% of all adults in the United States cannot read or write. Our state is not exempt from this epidemic. 12% of Oklahoma adults, over the age of 18, are functioning below the basic literacy level.

Imagine sitting in a restaurant with a group of people, looking at a menu, trying to decide what to order, and without letting anyone know you can't read. Are you ordering spaghetti, or are you ordering Madagascar Cockroaches? Imagine your child is deathly ill and has to be taken to the Emergency Room; you arrive in a frantic state - where is the ER?

It is not only about learning the concepts of reading and writing. A high rate of illiteracy affects everyone. It costs American taxpayers an estimated \$20 billion each year. That's "billion", not "million". However, a highly literate society has reduced crime rates, a healthier population, and a stronger economy. How tragic is it when society chooses to ignore the cost of illiteracy? What if, due to illiteracy, we are missing out on another Robert Frost, Mark Twain, or Henry David Thoreau? What if society is missing the key component to the cure for cancer?

"Literacy opens freedom's doors to both adults and children." (BPL Literacy Director, Karen Kerr-McGraw)

There is hope. That hope comes in the form of individuals who are willing to reach out and help others escape the illiteracy prison. Anyone can become part of this jailbreak. Please extend a helping hand to someone in need. You could be the one who helps unlock the cure to cancer by unlocking another's "illiteracy prison door"; thereby, opening a whole new world filled with freedom, hope, and literacy.

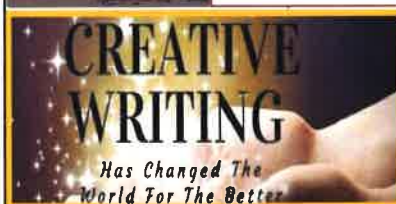

15th Annual Luminary Service

White Rose Cemetery

Honoring Those Whom We Have Lost

The 15th Annual White Rose Luminary Service will take place at 6:00P:M on Saturday November 18th at the White Rose Mausoleum.

To a grieving person the anticipation of the holidays is sometimes worse than the holidays themselves. A loss doesn't necessarily have to be recent, grief can creep up at any time such as holidays and anniversaries. Often these feeling are experienced years following a loved one's death.

Thanksgiving and Christmas can be especially challenging as those who are mourning the passing of a loved one can feel their absence in powerful ways. These feelings may make it particularly difficult to follow through with cherished traditions. Many who attend our annual service have made this event part of their holiday routine; a time to spend reflecting on their lost loved one.

It can be helpful simply being around others whom are experiencing similar emotions.

Some who have attend past Luminary Services are further along in the grieving process and have come to find a sense of peace in their lives; others are experiencing the intense grief of a recent loss.

Just knowing that a person isn't alone in his or her grief can be very comforting.

Luminaries, which consist of a small paper sack weighted down with sand and illuminated from within by an LED light, are placed around the halls of the White Rose Mausoleum. Each luminary has a card attached with the loved ones name and by whom they are being honored. After the service, consisting of a speaker, music, and the reading of the names of those being remembered; guests are invited to take their luminary and place it on the grave of their loved one.

Loved ones do not have to be buried at White Rose Cemetery to have a luminary created in their memory.

Luminaries cost only \$5 each.

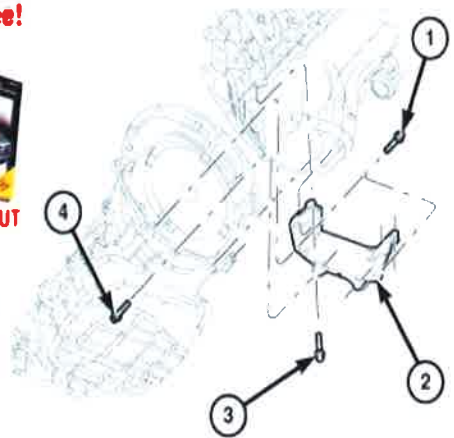
