What's All The Hoopla About?

Hoopla is a one stop shop for your streaming digital media needs. Collections included in this platform are Comics, Music, TV, Movies, Audiobooks, and eBooks in all genres and age groups. All checked items automatically return themselves, so there are never any late fees. There are no holds or wait times, checkout items instantly. It has hundreds of thousands of titles to choose from, with more being added daily. Hoopla is like having the library at your fingertips. Anytime. Anywhere. You can stream titles through your desktop browser or the mobile app, Chromecast, Roku, Amazon Alexa, Amazon Apps and Android Auto. If you use the mobile app, you can also download titles to your device for offline playback later, where Wi-Fi may be unavailable. All you need is your library card, your device, and the internet. Patrons can instantly borrow 5 items each month. Borrowing Periods: Books - 21 days, Videos - 72 Hrs. and Music - 7 days.

There is also a kids mode, Hoopla Kids Mode is a multi-format, digital media experience designed especially for kids (up to age 12). All of the content – movies, TV shows, music, audiobooks, eBooks, and comics – was curated and brought together in this one family-friendly place. There is a wide variety of television from BBC shows like *Father Brown* to *America's Top Dog.* Are you a crafty person? There are all kinds of videos showing fun crafty things to make. Like to cook or bake? You will want to check out the different ebooks, audiobook and television shows, like *From Crook to Cook* by Snoop Dogg. Just need some funny music for your toddler, check out Giggly Wiggly songs for Kids. The list can go on and on, trust us when we say there is absolutely something for everyone on Hoopla! Don't miss out on this great service and all that it has to offer, and remember its free with your library card.

To a grieving person the anticipation of the holidays is sometimes worse than the holidays themselves. A loss doesn't necessarily have to be recent, grief can creep up at any time such as holidays and anniversaries and often this happens even years after the death of a loved one. Thanksgiving and Christmas can be especially challenging as those who are mourning the passing of a loved one can feel that absence in powerful ways and it can be particularly difficult to follow through with cherished traditions. Many who attend our annual service have made this event part of their holiday routine, a time to spend reflecting on their lost loved one. It can be helpful just to be around others that are experiencing the same emotions. Some who attend



the Luminary Service are further along in the grieving process and have come to find a sense of peace in their lives; others are experiencing the intense grief of a recent loss. Just knowing that a person isn't alone in his or her grief can be very comforting.

Luminaries, which consist of a small paper sack weighted down with sand and illuminated by an LED light, are placed around the halls of the White Rose Mausoleum. Each luminary has a card attached with the loved ones name and by whom they are being honored. After a service including a speaker, music, and reading of the names of those being remembered, guests are invited to take their luminary and place it on the grave of their loved one.

Loved ones do not have to be buried at White Rose Cemetery to have a luminary in their memory.

Luminaries may be purchased for \$5 each. Checks may be brought to the Bartlesville Public Library Local and Family History Room or sent to the Bartlesville Public Library, attn: Kim Inman, 600 S. 


WELCOME IVONNE LEAP
